## **Welcome and Introduction**

Dear Friends, we gather in our homes this evening, at the same time as our community did in 1945, to commemorate the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Victory in Europe, when the sounds of war fell silent across this continent. As we remember those who gave their lives from across our nation, the commonwealth and also within our own villages, we also give thanks for the years of peace that the nations of Europe have enjoyed since the second world war. This evening we have the opportunity once more to reflect on the enormous sacrifice made by people from all walks of life, whose spirit of determination saw our nation through one of the darkest periods in its history. We remember the joyful gatherings in our streets, in our pubs, and our public spaces, and the sound of church bells ringing as people gave thanks following the years of sadness and loss. As we remember, and as we give thanks for peace, let us pray that God's will be done on earth as it is in heaven, as we join together and say:

**All: Our Father, who art in heaven,  
hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come;  
thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven.  
Give us this day our daily bread.  
And forgive us our trespasses,  
as we forgive those who trespass against us.  
And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.  
For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory,  
for ever and ever. Amen.**

## **The Readings**

From the VE Day speech of His Majesty King George VI

Today we give thanks to almighty God for a great deliverance. Speaking from our Empire's oldest capital city, war-battered but never for one moment daunted or dismayed—speaking from London, I ask you to join with me in that act of thanksgiving.

There is great comfort in the thought that the years of darkness and danger in which the children of our country have grown up are over and, please God, for ever. We shall have failed and the blood of our dearest will have flowed in vain if the victory which they died to win does not lead to a lasting peace, founded on justice and good will. This is the task to which now honour binds us. In the hour of danger, we humbly committed our cause into the hand of God and he has been our strength and shield. Let us thank him for his mercies and in this hour of victory commit ourselves and our new task to the guidance of that same strong hand.

A reading from the Letter of St Paul to the Romans 8.31-39

What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, 'For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered.' No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

This is the Word of the Lord.

Let us give thanks for those who work for peace and liberty throughout the world, for Her Majesty's Armed Forces, and for all who strive to bring an end to injustice and oppression; let us bless the Lord.

**All: Thanks be to God.**

We pray for those in our own day who have grown weary or lost hope as a result of violence or terror; for all refugees and displaced people, and for those who seek to address the causes of discord and distrust; Lord, hear us.

**All: Lord, graciously hear us.**

We pray for the young people of our own day and for all who will shape the future of this nation, that they may be inspired by those who have gone before them to serve as they have been served; Lord, hear us.

**All: Lord, graciously hear us.**

For the reconciliation of former enemies and for the flourishing of goodwill between them, and for the many freedoms and benefits we enjoy as a result of the sacrifices which have made for peace; let us bless the Lord.

**All: Thanks be to God.**

### **The Collect for Peace**

(from the Book of Common Prayer)

O GOD, from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works do proceed; Give unto thy servants that peace which the world cannot give; that our hearts may be set to obey thy commandments, and also that by thee, we, being defended from the fear of our enemies, may pass our time in rest and quietness; through the merits of Jesus Christ our Saviour. **All: Amen.**
